Course Description and Objectives

German 202 is a German language and culture course that is intended to introduce you to longer stretches of written and spoken "texts". It entertains a broad definition of "text", which includes materials like fairy tales, parodies, poetry, prose, articles, videos, films, etc. You will engage with course material through written, spoken, auditory, and visual modes, and interact with your classmates around a variety of themes, including traditional and modern fairy tales and fairy-tale moments, the "fairytale-esque" in literature and everyday life, humor and social critique, and migration and exile. Throughout the course, you will complete various assignments and projects relating back to the themes we have discussed in the course.

This online, 5-week intensive intermediate German course presents material that is usually covered during a 16-week semester. In other words, you should anticipate at least **2 hours** per day (Monday through Friday) to engage with course material, collaborating with classmates, and completing assignments.

By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- read, write, speak and listen on a wide range of topics in German.
- comprehend stories and descriptions of moderate length and in a range of genres.
- prepare and present in a generally coherent and stylistically-aware way.
- reflect upon your understanding of various cultures and histories of the Germanspeaking world.

Prerequisites and Placement

The prerequisite for this course is the successful completion of German 201 or its equivalent. If you have not taken German 201 and want to enroll in this course, you are required to talk to your instructor about which course(s) may be more appropriate for you. Native speakers of German may not enroll in this course.

Required Materials

Materials include texts, films, and additional handouts made available on the D2L course site. Because this is an online course, you will need access to:

• the D2L course site

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- a laptop or desktop computer
- reliable internet connection
- a microphone and webcam
- Discord, a web-based / app-based tool for conducting and recording spoken and text-based conversations
- up-to-date Java, FlashPlayer, and web browsers
- University of Arizona email

It is imperative that you visit the D2L course site **every day** for announcements, assignments, and materials. Class Discussions and Activities (25%):

In order for you to participate as actively as possible, activities based on course materials will be assigned on a daily basis. For example, you will read texts, view films and videos, answer discussion and/or comprehension questions, and conduct individual research on topics within each unit. Online, whole-class discussions will be conducted in both written and spoken modes using D2L-Discussions and VoiceThread. Please ensure that you have the necessary hardware (i.e. microphone, webcam) to participate in these conversations. Resources are available through UA libraries.

• Written Compositions (20%):

Chelsea Timlin University of Arizona You will write two longer compositions related to the topics of the class throughout the session. Two drafts of each composition will be submitted to D2L-Assignments. You will receive feedback on the drafts and will be expected to revise your compositions with regard to various categories (i.e. content, style, and grammar).

Critical Conversations (20%)

o In order to practice **speaking freely** in German while interpreting the course material, you will engage in online conversations (spoken and written) with a classmate using Discord. This is a web-based and app-based platform for voice and text-based conversations. You will create a "channel" on the course Discord server for each conversation and record any voice conversations using the bot "Craig". Conversation topics and deadlines will be announced under "Content" on the D2L course page and in the D2L Calendar. Details on how to use Discord and "Craig" will be provided under "Content as well. **Please ensure that you have the necessary hardware (i.e. microphone) to participate in these conversations.** Resources are available through UA libraries.

• Collaborative Projects & Presentations (20%):

 You will complete several projects and presentations relating to the themes we have discussed as a class. The projects will generally be completed in pairs or small groups and will involve either recording a presentation using VoiceThread or preparing and posting a PowerPoint/Prezi presentation to D2L-Discussions.

• Unit Reflections (15%):

This course consists of three units. At the end of each unit there will be a reflection, which is intended to provide an opportunity to reflect on the development of your individual German language abilities in areas such as reading, writing, listening, viewing, speaking, analyzing, etc. These reflections will consist of 4 to 5 short-response questions, and will be completed using the Quizzes tool on D2L.
